INSTRUCTOR INFORMATION

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COURSE DESCRIPTION

This intensive focuses on issues of vocational identity and healthy professional patterns. In addition, it is designed to explore the meaning of credentialed and endorsed ministry in the Evangelical Covenant Church and the responsibilities and competencies of those called to these positions. Areas of inquiry will include: licensing, commissioning, ordination, ethical guidelines, formal care and discipline, collegiality, ministerial health and boundaries.

COURSE OBJECTIVES

By the end of the course, the student will be able to:

- 1) Articulate clearly a Biblical and theological understanding of vocational life and ministry.
- 2) Participate fully in personal and vocational assessments as they relate to the practice of ministry
- 3) Know the Rules for the Ordered Ministry and the Ethical Principles for Covenant Ministers as they apply to one's life and ministry. Become familiar with one's own denominational documents.
- 4) Describe and commit to ongoing development of the pastor/minister as leader.
- 5) Identify patterns and spiritual formation disciplines within the ministerial journey that contribute to health and excellence.
- 6) Create a "Life Rule", including a self-care plan, which embraces a spiritual and behavioral code that sustains ministerial health. (Note specifics in Reader distributed in class but outlined below.)

ASSESSMENTS

Pre-Intensive

- **Write an "Adaptive Challenge"** to be completed prior to our first in-person meeting and presented in class. See guidelines in Canvas.

- **Complete three personality instruments** (upload results by **September 7**). Students may not attend class if they have failed to complete these tests.

One of the keys to successful ministry is a deep understanding of oneself, including one's strengths and vulnerabilities. This knowledge can only increase the pastor's capacity for healthy ministry. Inventories, conversations, and times for reflection comprise this process, which is designed to enhance self-understanding and identify practical steps for further growth as a pastor and person. These instruments are not an assessment of your call to ministry, rather an opportunity to explore who you are as you live into your call, being aware of the uniqueness of your personality and giftedness.

You are responsible for taking these three assessments and uploading the results to Canvas:

1. **Style Matters:** Go to <https://www.riverhouseeepress.com/index.php/en/order/as-user> to order. Place the \$59 product in your shopping cart and proceed to checkout. There you will see a place to enter your coupon code, which is: **student14**. That will bring the price to \$16. You will be automatically transferred to the assessment as soon as you've completed the purchase, or you can login later with instructions that will be in the emailed invoice. If you have difficulties, send a note to center@riverhouseeepress.com; they normally respond within 24 hours and usually less. It takes about 15 minutes to pay and take the assessment, and you will receive a score report immediately, both on your screen and sent to your email. For best quality display of the report, follow the instructions at top of the report and view it either in a PDF or printed form.
2. **Golden Personality Profiler:** Go to: <http://www.goldenllc.com/golden-personalityprofiler-admin.php>. Click on "Take a Test" from the menu on the left. Click on "Golden Personality Profiler Take this Test." Then, click on "I want to use my credit card to purchase a Golden assessment." Follow the instructions on the site from there. The cost is \$29.95.
3. **Wagner Enneagram Personality Style Scales:** Go to: <https://www.wepss.com/>. Follow the instructions on the site to purchase the test for \$15.00.

If you have taken any of these assessments in the past 12 months and have access to your results, you may upload these to Canvas and do not have to retake the assessment.

Post-Intensive

- **Meet with a spiritual director** for one follow-up session (confirmation due **October 9**).
- **Submit an 8-12 page "Life Rule"** (due **October 9**), including the following two portions: (1) Introduction: How are your practices of ministry going to be changed because of this course? What have you learned about yourself in this class: what are your potential concerns/vulnerabilities and benefits? (2) "Life Rule," incorporating all elements of the class. (See template in Reader for full instructions.)
